CEO's Address

Matthew Granger

Hi everyone,

It is with no small amount of sadness that I start this letter by announcing, for those unaware, that I have resigned as CEO of Legacy WA. I wish to take this opportunity to reflect and highlight some of the achievements that I have proudly steered Legacy through. My last day will be the 3rd of May—this coming Friday as I write this.

We began in late 2021 with that amazing project to verify all the contact details we held for all our beneficiaries in the database. With a steady stream of volunteers and hard-working staff we called each one of you and, where no answer occurred, we steadily built up a collection of contacts to follow up. Eventually—after about 12 months—we were able to accurately determine that we had just about 2500 living beneficiaries, and we've operated off this clean set of data ever since.

In 2022, in partnership with the RSLWA, we hosted the inaugural Better Together Ball. This event is now a key date on our events and fundraising calendar. Additionally, we have developed a solid working relationship with the RSLWA.



A highlight of 2023 was the Torch Relay, which saw Legacy clubs from all over come together to celebrate Legacy. It was great to be involved in and something that Legacy WA will always look back on. A strong focus of my energy to support Legacy WA and work towards ensuring its long-term security was to view everything with a productivity and cost-saving return on investment: especially that of the staff's time and work efforts. These projects included:

- We completed a digital upgrade to modernise our accounting system, reducing man-hours and increasing efficiency, thereby creating a more seamless accounting process.
- Implementing the 3-Tier policy to ensure fairness in allocating funds to those families most in need.
- Implementing a far more rigorous risk assessment and management framework.
- Identifying the need and a pathway to upgrading the IT structure, network and security.
- Increasing the outflow to beneficiaries from donations from 61% to 63%.



- Structuring the camp access to a wider first responder and allied community network, revenue from which permits beneficiaries to stay at the camp at no cost throughout the year.
- In conjunction with the Board, steering the sale of Fremantle House thereby freeing up a near-idle asset for investment.
- Increasing invested capital funds under management from \$1.3m in 2021 to \$2.8m, which has accrued ~\$400,000 in gains and is now valued at \$3.2m. My target was to build this to \$10m by the end of 2027 to generate returns that will fund operations and allow nearly 100% of donations to flow straight to you: our beneficiaries.
- Building a team that focuses on identifying and increasing our income from grants (we've increased the Belfer Trust grant from \$15k to \$35k, the Perron Foundation from \$10k to \$30k, and our target for 2024 Anzac Day Trust application this year will be \$1.5m up from \$1.13m).
- Creating the project to digitise relevant policies into an easily accessible Wiki-style format, now available to any authorised person via their smartphone, tablet or PC.
- We joined the pensions officers with the Community Services team under one Team Leader, a far more sensible and realistic model of how we actually provided services to you.

There have been many events that I have thoroughly enjoyed being a part of.

The Jingles will always remain a highlight for the staff and Legatees. The Street Appeals are another major event that I have valued, and of course, all the golf days, specifically at Lake Karrinyup and with BAE out at RAAF Base Pearce.

When I started my CEO tenure, I worked closely with Peter Emmett who was the President at the time and I'd like to thank Peter for his contributions whilst I was CEO. As I am sure you are aware, late last year we welcomed Steve Stoll as the President. I look forward to seeing where Steve and the next CEO take Legacy and wish them the best in doing so.

To all the staff at Legacy WA, thank you for working alongside me to achieve so much. We have worked through many challenges but together, we have always remained focused on why we are doing it, for our beneficiaries. Thank you to all for the support and fellowship over my journey. I have thoroughly enjoyed my time and look forward to seeing what is next for Legacy WA.

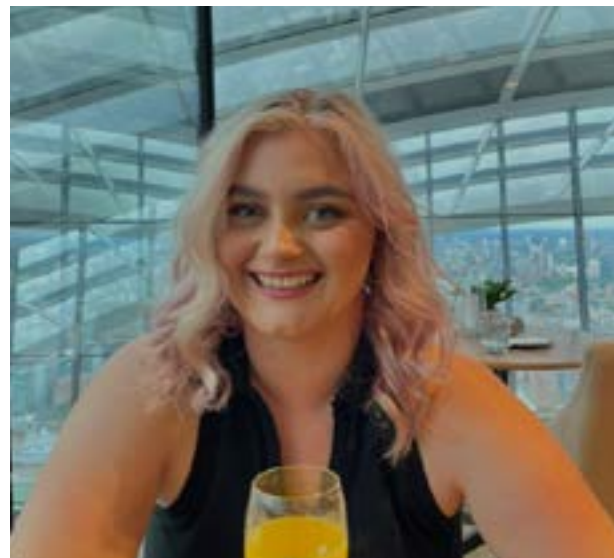

The Community Services Team

The Community Services Team at Legacy WA comprises of the Community Service Officers & the Pension Officers

Kathryn is the Team Leader overseas the overall community activity & strategy & Joanna is the Community Services Officer. They are the first point of contact for intake & enrolments of new beneficiaries; Identifying their needs and referring them to relevant staff members & resources. For grieving widows, support from the Department of Veterans Affairs (DVA) can be especially crucial.

Legacy WA's pension staff consists of Graham & Fiona. Prior to working with Legacy they have worked for DVA for 20 plus years and combined, have experience with compensation, income support and general DVA matters.



How They Can Help

"We had an enquiry last year from a widow of a TPI veteran, who had separated before the veteran died (in 2014), and had never received the war widows pension. She had in fact not been aware of her potential eligibility, until a friend suggested she contact Legacy about it.

The death certificate and other documentation was provided to DVA, and DVA immediately commenced payment, and sent her a Gold Card, but refused to backpay the pension. After some deliberation on my part including submissions relating to the legal aspects of it, DVA have agreed to backpay her pension to 2014. This is a substantial amount.

It needs to be noted that DVA may not necessarily have been at fault in not being aware of her eligibility at the time of the veteran's death." - Graham

- Answering questions relating to most DVA matters including aged care, Veterans' Home care, transport, rehabilitation aids and appliances
- Liaising with DVA on your behalf
- Helping you to understand correspondence received from DVA

Blast From The Past - Brian Edwards

Brian Edwards was a Legacy ward and later Legatee who just wanted to in some small way, repay Legacy, who provided him with so much.

On 2 March 1990, after some fifteen years of planning, Brian Edwards, left RAF Binbrook Airfield in England bound for Australia. Flying solo in his 1943 De Havilland DH82A Tiger Moth 'Matilda', he set off, in honour of his late father, who went missing in action in World War II. Brian's father, Pilot Officer Clifford Edwards, was the pilot of a 460 Squadron Lancaster based at Binbrook, Lincolnshire. He and his crew failed to return from operations over Cologne on 3 July 1943. Now Brian would make the trip of a lifetime in tribute to his father. A major reason which prompted Brian to do this was to return something to Legacy. Legacy supported Brian through his

school and university days, and he saw this flight, as one way of saying thank you.

It was a huge anti-climax when Brian was forced down in a UK paddock by a broken crankshaft on 2 March. Yet the aircraft was repairable, and three weeks later, on 23 March 1990, Brian set off again for Australia. He eventually luckily reached Australia and landed at Kalumburu. Landing with a broken throttle cable to a typical Corroboree greeting on the airstrip by about 30 locals.

Finally, on 13 May 1990, Brian and 'Matilda' took off on the last leg to Langley Park, Perth's original airfield. Brian was feeling quite emotional: 'As I flew over the Darling Range, the tall buildings of Perth came into view. It was a magnificent sight'.



Brian took 'Matilda' over Armadale, where four Tiger Moths were waiting to escort him in. They flew in formation along the Canning River, over the Narrows Bridge, and into the circuit for Langley Park. Brian landed 'Matilda' in front of about 16,000 people, after an epic of 47 days and many adventures. He was welcomed by the Military District Band playing Waltzing Matilda. More than \$40,000 was passed on to Legacy as a result of his flight, and Brian was made a Life Member of Torchbearers for Legacy.

On 26 January 1991, Brian was presented with the Australian Achiever Award by Bob Hawke. The honours flowed and in 1992 Brian was awarded the Order of Australia Medal (OAM) for his services to Legacy and to Physiotherapy.

Brian started Edwards Winery in Margaret River; however, 'Matilda' was not to be denied, just by the growing of grapes and a very successful winery. In 1993, Brian published 'The Matilda Mission', an engaging record of his epic flight. Proceeds from the book were donated to Legacy. Brian then conceived another fund-raising flight for Legacy – this time an anti-clockwise circumnavigation of Australia.

On Sunday 26 September 1993, Brian flew the first leg of 'Mission Matilda II' to Cunderdin, with WA Governor Sir Francis Burt as passenger.

The circumnavigation took 36 days. Brian had media interviews to promote Legacy at all 71 landing spots around Australia. Enormous publicity for Legacy in Australia. Some highlights were, appeared on the Bert Newton Show in Melbourne and lunch with Premier of Victoria Jeff Kennett.

On the leg from Melbourne to Wagga Wagga, Brian was accompanied by the Channel 7 'Real Life' crew and appeared in the news that night.

About ten minutes south of the Townsville landing, Brian was somewhat shocked when he was intercepted by two Blackhawk helicopters from the Australian Army's 5 Aviation Regiment.



On Sunday 31 October 1993, Legatee Peter Heeney organised a grand welcome for a great West Australian, and the Sunday Times featured an article on Brian's arrival. A public address system was installed, and the landing zone roped off. Media included ABC's WA General Manager (and pilot) later Legatee Glen Darlington for MC duties.

'Matilda' made her appearance to the west of Langley Park. Brian then took her over the Narrows Bridge, along the Swan River, for a landing towards the west. As he drew abeam the crowd, Legatee Glen Darlington called over the PA system, 'Come on everybody, start waving'. Brian performed a perfect cross wind landing, touching down at 1125 hrs, and parking 30 meters from the dais.

Amid handshakes of welcome home and interviews a formation of four RAAF PC9s from No 2 Flying Training School flew overhead at 500 ft 'to the oohs and aahs of spectators.

Brian was then ushered to the dais where Sir Francis Burt commended Brian on his magnificent effort for Legacy and stated that the flight was an important event in the history of Australian Aviation. Brian responded, saying that the greatest reward for the trip was the raising of \$70,000 for Legacy.

Brian's 35-day fundraising flight covered 12,949 kms (7,000 nautical miles) in 97 flying hours, and 71 take-offs and landings. This broke the previous biplane record of 44 days around Australia set in 1924 by a RAAF Fairey III-D seaplane.

However, Brian's health declined, and he was diagnosed with leukemia. He battled the disease with great courage and strength but passed away at the age of 62 on 20 November 2003.

Brian's ashes were taken for a last ride in a Tiger Moth and spread over his vineyard airfield. Today, 'Matilda' sits in pride of place in her own hanger adjacent to the Edwards Cellar Door, at Edwards Winery.

Legatee Peter Heeney said it was an honour to be a friend of Brian and coordinate "Matilda Mission 2". It took over 12 months to pull the epic flight together as a nationally coordinated fundraiser and public awareness project.

Please pay respects to Legatee Brian Clifford Edwards OAM when next in Legacy House.

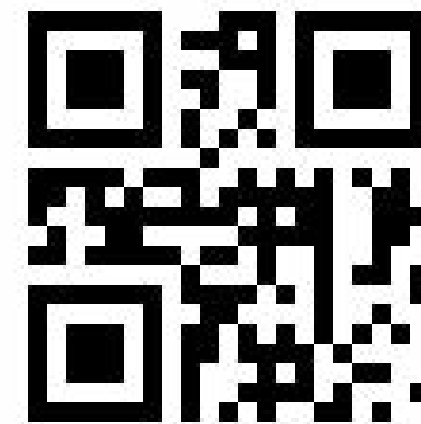
Roger: I am sure the members are very appreciative of you and the volunteer's contribution to the club over the years, and the mural is a fitting tribute to you all.

This year the older children were allocated a junior to mentor. The care and support provided by the older kids was greatly appreciated by the younger ones while they learnt the ropes.



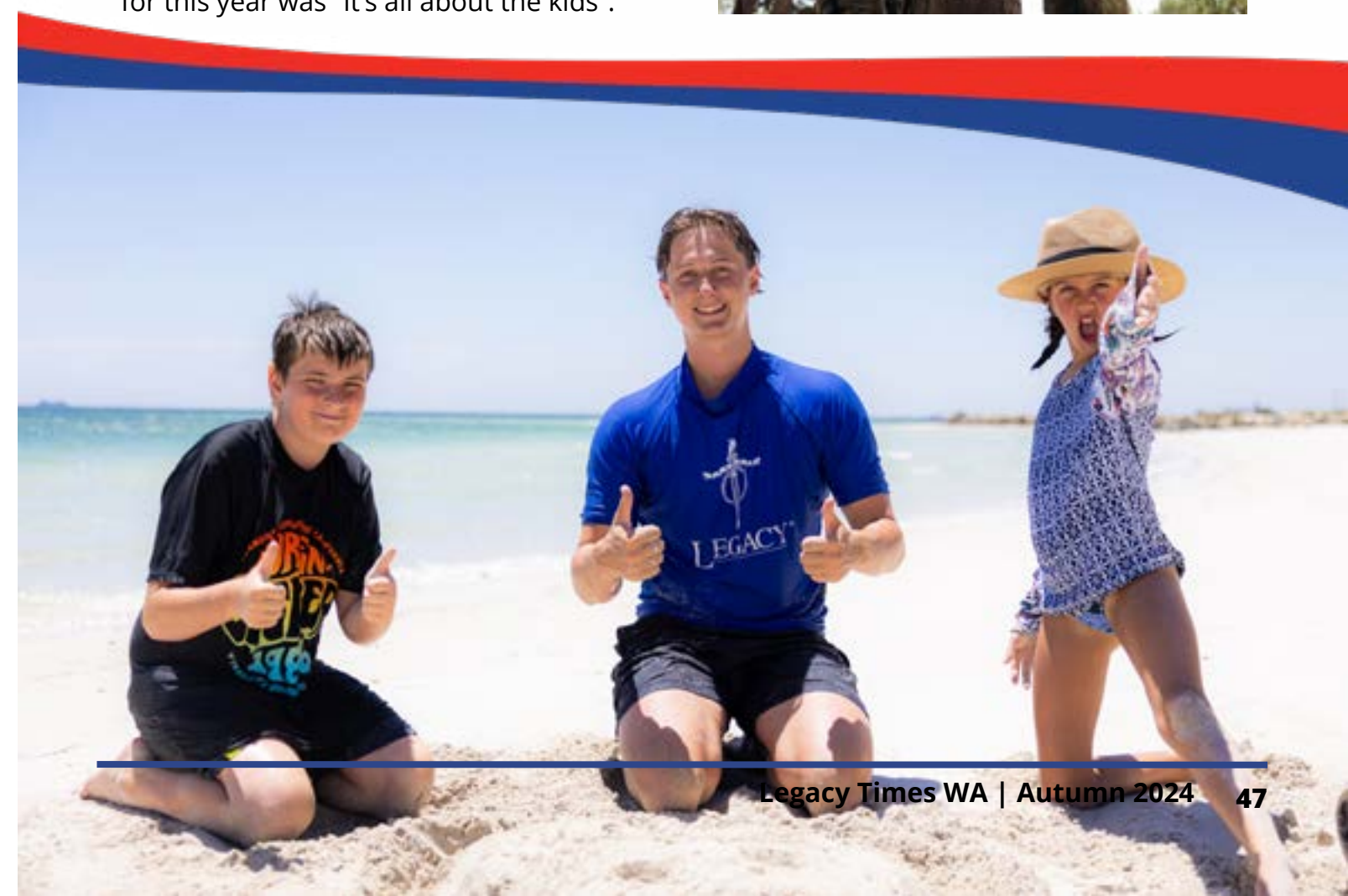

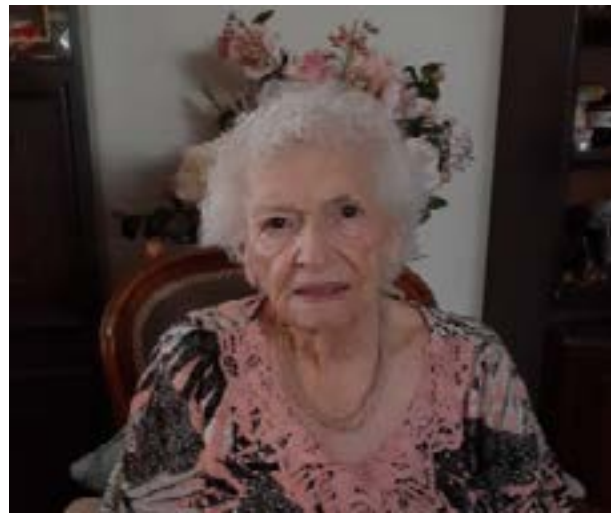
Nancy Huxtable's 100th Birthday!

Linda's Best Ever Root Vegetable Soup

Ingredients

- 1 x tablespoon extra virgin olive oil
- 340g carrots, peeled and chopped
- 170g kumara (orange sweet potato), peeled and chopped
- 170g parsnips, peeled and chopped
- 230g onions, peeled and chopped
- 3 x cloves garlic
- 860 mls chicken bone broth (substitute with vegetable stock for a vegetarian option)
- 10 x Black peppercorns (Omit for AIP elimination) & salt
- 5 x Bay-leaves
- 1 bunch parsley
- 5 sprigs thyme
- 230 mls Coconut milk

Method

1. Throw your fat into a large pot. Melt over a medium heat.
2. Add chopped vegetables and sweat for five minutes (I use a timer).
3. Add the bone broth, herbs, peppercorns and season generously with salt.
4. Bring to the boil. Pop on the lid and lower the heat to a simmer. Cook for twenty minutes or until the vegetables are tender.
5. Remove the herbs. Carefully purée your mixture (in batches) in your blender. Add the coconut milk as you blend.
6. Taste for seasoning and serve with freshly chopped parsley as a garnish.
