# Junior Legacy Holds Winter Warmer at BOUNCE Cannington






# Legacy and the Western Australian University Regiment

Legacy, and members of the Western Australian University Regiment (WAUR) came to the rescue of 97 year old Mrs Lorene Bruce of Applecross whose back garden required some serious attention from an overgrown creeper that had the potential of placing much strain on the back fence.

Sgt Jill Bryant and her energetic team of volunteers of Army Reserve soldiers cut, slashed, and sawed their way through many years of entangled vine taking great care in ensuring they did not damage a glass house which had many years of growth on its fragile roof.

Family members were in attendance, providing freshly baked biscuits in addition to tea, coffee and plenty of cold water for the troops which were most certainly welcomed. I can attest to how tasty the jam biscuits were!

Mrs Bruce thanked all those who helped and you can see how delighted she was from her smile, see page 2. Her daughter, Pam, provided us with some background on her father which provides context to the younger generation about the brave generation of the 1940s.

James Bruce joined King Lines Ships in 1933 and eventually transferred to the Blue Funnel Line where he completed his studies, obtaining his Masters Certificate in 1938.

In 1942 at Singapore, as Second Mate, he was on the MV Gorgon, as part of the Merchant Navy. On 11 February, this 3,500 ton Passenger and Cargo Vessel was the last ship to leave the Singapore Wharf prior to its fall and capture by the Japanese. 342 women and 42 soldiers were on board together

as no one was refused a berth. They finally sailed on Friday 13th February 1942 and were attacked in the Durian Straits by 67 Japanese aircraft.

After being on continuous watch for five days from Singapore to Fremantle he eventually succumbed to exhaustion after arriving in Fremantle. He suffered temporary blindness in one eye but eventually recovered.

Three months later he re-joined the "Gorgon" in Brisbane and headed off to Milne Bay in New Guinea with cargo for the allied troops. At Milne Bay the Gorgon was targeted by Japanese Dive Bombers and the ship received direct hits, killing 35. As the



ship was on fire, Jimmy led and coordinated the firefighting, both above and below decks, at times with no more than fire buckets. This continued until help arrived from other naval ships. Two days later he discovered an unexploded bomb in the cargo hold in amongst army ordinance. He then ordered the crew to safety whilst he went down into the hold and with the assistance of an American Major retrieved the bomb and brought it to the deck. He then took the bomb and disposed of it over the side of the ship into the sea. For this action he received a Member of the British Empire, MBE.

## Eulogy

# Peter John Hart

Peter John Hart was born on 1<sup>st</sup> August 1931 in Bournemouth England to Kathleen and Fred Hart. Peter was called up for National service in 1952 where he joined the Royal Air Force. His education meant he began to train as air crew. Rising through the ranks, he became a pilot and went to many postings in the UK and overseas.

While posted at St Andrews in Scotland he met Barbara Shepherd who was nursing there at the time. Soon a couple, they enjoyed life together and married on the 13<sup>th</sup> February, 1960. Peter undertook deployments which required periods of separation from Barbara. Now a Flight Lieutenant, he flew the Gloster Javelin from which he ejected on two occasions, costing the RAF a great deal of money and himself some serious injury including a compressed spinal fracture.

Peter and Barbara's first child Lesley was born in 1962 and two years later, son Jonathan arrived whilst they were living in Lincolnshire. In England, Peter's final base before retiring from the Air Force was Cosford, Shropshire where youngest son, Simon made the family complete.

After leaving the Force, Peter wasn't content with being a civilian. The decision to board The Fairstar in Southampton and venture to Australia as ten pound POMS was made. Fremantle became their destination, 49 years ago.

A keen card player, Peter was involved in the formation of the Kalamunda District Bridge Club and became a State Director, a role he held for many years.

Peter then attended the University of WA to study a degree in Journalism. By this time, the family moved onto an acre block in Kalamunda – their home for the next 40 years. With the children at local schools, it was a tough decision to take up a position as an English teacher in Darkan, 200 kilometres south east of Perth. The following year, he was appointed to Eastern Hills Senior High School.

Peter spent the remainder of his working life as Personnel and Payroll officer for what was then, the Slow Learning Children's Group. He was a

major driver in the change to the current and more appropriate name of ACTIV Foundation.

The family loved the outdoor lifestyle. Camping at Moore River every summer, they sailed their little red dinghy, enjoying picnics by the beach. This peaceful life was shattered in 1980 when eldest son Jonathan was diagnosed with leukaemia. Jono fought hard but his battle was sadly lost in 1981. Peter handled the tragic loss with stoicism, keeping his much loved son's memory alive.

Peter's first grandchildren Rachel and Megan in the early 1990s filled him with pride, and he loved nothing more than spending time in their company be it rolling on the floor, filling them with yummy treats, or making them laugh. This desire to spend time with them helped him fight the odds and survive a heart attack and bypass surgery in 1994.

In 1996 he decided retirement was due. When the early stages of Alzheimer's took hold, Peter was keen to trial medication that slowed the progress. Although he was no longer permitted to drive, he rode his bike and walked whenever he could.

When care at home became too difficult, Peter found support at Jeremiah Donovan House where the staff loved his gentle manner and sense of humour. Peter continued to show the determination to live as he had many times previously. It was a sad time watching him lose control of his life over the past eight years and in true caring style, he chose to leave us when we had all said our goodbyes and he was sure we were off doing what we needed to be doing.

Peter was much loved and respected by many and will live on in the hearts and minds of us all.




## Molly Robinson


Betty always remains positive, any bad situations were always dealt with and then she moved on. This she attributes to good manners passed on by her parents.

## Date and Ginger Cake

### INGREDIENTS

- 1 Cup dates
- 1 Teaspoon bicarb soda
- 1 Cup water
- ½ Cup butter
- ¾ Cup self-raising flour
- ¾ Cup plain flour
- ½ Cup sugar
- 1 Teaspoon ground ginger
- 1 Packet chopped ginger

### METHOD

1. Preheat the oven to 180°C.
2. Boil the dates, bicarb soda and water together. Remove from heat and add the butter. Set aside to cool.
3. Add the rest of the ingredients to the date mixture and mix well. Place in a baking tin and cook for 10 minutes. Lower the temperature to 150°C and continue to cook until a skewer inserted comes out dry.

## Keeping the Promise Alive

How do you tell your children – four precious children under the age of eleven that their dad has died? That he has taken his life because he could not longer cope with the physical and mental torment that had become his reality?

That was the impossible question Angela Brient asked herself in the wake of the shocking passing of her beloved husband Terry, a proud RAAF Sergeant who devoted twenty two years of his life in service to this country.

Angela describes Terry as “...an absolutely devoted father” and “the most even tempered man around”. He was, she says, someone who loved a laugh and who would welcome people into his circle with open arms.

Terry was Angela’s first love. They met when Angela had finished Year 12 and was preparing to move to New Zealand to study medicine at university. Terry, then a Leading Aircraftman, was a Communications Electronics Technician with the RAAF ICCS Squadron, based at Richmond in Sydney.

After a two month long distance relationship, Angela moved to Sydney to take up university studies in Advanced Biology. Just two weeks later, Terry left Australia for his first deployment to East Timor. It was a frightening time for Angela who did not know if he would return or if he would come home bearing scars. Deployment would interrupt the couple again, months after they married in Perth in 2004, when Terry was again deployed to the Middle East. Angela would later discover that she had been two weeks’ pregnant with their first child when she tearfully farewelled her husband on that deployment.

On 31 July 2017, this courageous member of the Australian Defence Force took his own life. It was just a matter of weeks after the family lost Terry that Angela was first put in touch with Legacy.

Over the coming months (as he remains today,) Angela’s Legatee (Legacy volunteer) Steve, was by the family’s side: ensuring that Legacy helped to ease the burden wherever we could; helping Angela claim her rightful entitlements; offering constant family support. Helping the children on their road to healing through Legacy Children’s Camps.

Legacy was founded in 1923 on a promise to veterans like Terry: to support the families that are left behind.
