#### Legacy Does More to Remember



Remembrance Day, 11 November 2018.

At 11am on 11 November 2018, the nation stopped with a minute's silence to remember those who died or suffered in war and armed conflicts.

Every year we carry out this silence in appreciation of the sacrifices made. As 2018 marked 100 years of the Armistice that ended World War One, Legacy WA wanted to do more than just remember.

Our Remembrance Appeal started on 1 November with 30 cafes and pubs across Perth displaying our collection containers for the month. The Sandbar raised \$346 with their '\$1 from every Coopers Schooner and Murphy's Irish Pub in Mandurah raised a massive \$4,415.65 with their meat raffle and other collections. On the Day, the fundraising team and a rally of volunteers were



invited into Yagan Square to collect donations by local restaurant Street Eats Eatery. Street Eats hosted a Sunday Session with flowing canapés and cheap pints with proceeds from the canapés donated back to Legacy; over \$1,000 was raised!

Plenty of community fundraising took place in November as well. Special mention to WA RSL Bowls Section who donated \$2,000 raised at the club. Residents at Settlers Ridgewood Rise raised over \$900 for Legacy WA at their Remembrance event, and longtime volunteer Russel Monk together with his family, collected \$1,511.90 at Bunnings in Australind. With many more activities throughout the month, we raised \$20,000 within our local community and alongside our Direct Mail campaign, the Remembrance total has since jumped to over \$40,000.

Having not had an appeal for Remembrance until now, this result has completely exceeded our expectations and has set the bar high for next vear!

A humongous thank you goes out to all of the volunteers who lent a hand during this appeal. The graduate team at Thales, regular volunteers/ Legatees' Wendy Ezzy and Bill Roberts and TechnipFMC regular, Cameron Webb were all eagerly shaking tins in Yagan Square on the 11<sup>th</sup>.

With the support of volunteers, community groups and a number of local businesses, Legacy WA was able to do more than just remember in 2018.



The kind members of Ellenbrook RSL Sub Branch donated 20 Christmas Hampers to Legacy WA which will be distributed by Legatees to some of our ladies who are doing it a bit tough at this time of the year.

Our heartfelt thanks go to the Club Secretary, Cassandra McQueen, who organised the hampers with her young band of RSL members and families.

Sub Branch will ensure some Christmas joy with a few extra goodies on such a special day on the calendar.

The day was a great success with over 400 people in attendance. A number of stall holder items were included into three prizes that were then raffled to raise \$1,137.75. This coupled with the sale of some plants grown by Legacy widow Val Bell and the sale and donations towards Legacy merchandise rounded up a grand total of over \$1,300.



Recipe

#### **Cherry Pistachio Stollen**

#### Stollen is a traditional German Christmas bread filled with fruit and nuts.

1 egg

• 1/2 Teaspoon finely grated orange rind

1/2 Teaspoon ground cardamom

• 1 Teaspoon ground cinnamon

1 Cup (150g) icing sugar mixture

• 3 Cups (450g) plain flour

• 40g butter, melted

• 1 Tablespoon milk

#### **INGREDIENTS**

- 100g red glace cherries, halved (see note)
- 1/2 Cup (95g) mixed peel
- 1/2 Cup (75g) pistachios
- 1/4 Cup (60ml) orange liqueur (such as Triple Sec, Cointreau or Grand Marnier)
- 2 Teaspoons (1 sachet/7g) dried yeast
- 1/2 Cup (125ml) warm milk
- 1/3 Cup (70g) caster sugar
- 125g butter

#### **METHOD**

- 1. Combine cherries, mixed peel, pistachios and orange liqueur in a medium bowl. Set aside for 1 hour to macerate.
- 2. Combine the yeast, milk and 2 teaspoons of the caster sugar in a small bowl. Set aside for 5 minutes or until foaming.
- 3. Use an electric mixer to beat the butter and remaining sugar in a medium bowl until pale and creamy. Add the egg and beat until just combined. Add the orange rind and cardamom and stir to combine. Add the yeast mixture and flour and stir to combine. Turn onto a lightly floured surface and gently knead for 5 minutes or until smooth. Place in a greased bowl and cover with plastic wrap. Set aside in a warm draught-free place for 1 1/2 -2 hours or until dough doubles in size.
- 4. Preheat oven to 180°C. Knock down dough with your fist. Grease 10 (1/2 cup/125ml capacity) mini loaf pans. Roll into a 40 x 50cm rectangle. Brush with melted butter and sprinkle with cinnamon. Sprinkle with cherry mixture. Roll from a long side to enclose filling. Use a sharp knife to cut crossways into 5cm-wide pieces. Place in the prepared loaf pans. Loosely cover with plastic wrap and set aside for 20 minutes to rise. Bake in preheated oven for 20 minutes or until golden brown and loaves sound hollow when tapped on the base. Turn onto a wire rack and leave to cool.
- 5. Combine the icing sugar and milk in a small bowl to form a smooth paste. Drizzle over the loaves. Leave aside to set.

Notes: If you don't like glace cherries, substitute them with sultanas or currants. You can also use any liqueur you prefer; kirsch (a cherry liqueur) also works well with this recipe. Also makes 2 large loaves.

#### We remember. We honour. 100 years on.

On this day – as every other day of the year – Joan pauses to remember Jim, her husband of 57 years. This loving war widow salutes him not only for his military service, but for his devotion as her husband and father to their three daughters.

Joan is now in her early 90s, and the youngest of their three girls, Kathy, is now in her 50s. Kathy recalls her dad as "...firm but fair: a bit of a pussycat actually!" Born with an intellectual disability, Kathy was very close with her father, and very proud of his war service and his community volunteer work later in life.



Jim served with the 2/4 Australian Field Regiment (Australian Army) in the Middle East and New Guinea from 1941 through 1946. He would meet his future wife on a train after he returned to Australia. They married in 1949, and in 1952 built their first home: where Joan continues to live, thanks to the support of people like you.

"This is the home that my husband built for us. It's where my memories of Jim and the girls and the family are. I couldn't imagine leaving this place... and I think Thank God for Legacy that I can stay here!"

Joan first reached out to Legacy not long after Jim passed away in 2007.

"I joined Legacy as I thought Kathy might benefit from involvement with their social programs and activities. I was also facing some big challenges getting my pension. Legacy stepped in...and they never gave up!"

Legacy spent more than two years fighting on Joan's behalf to help her access a War Widow's pension. For that, she is incredibly grateful.

"Legacy's determination in securing my War Widow's pension has been a huge help financially, and it has given me access to a wonderful level of medical support. And knowing that I can continue to count on their assistance to enable me to stay in my own home as I grow older; I can't thank Legacy supporters enough for that peace of mind!"

"But it is what Legacy has done for Kathy – the wonderful opportunities it has provided for her – that I am most grateful for. She has absolutely thrived since she has been part of the Legacy family."

Kathy credits Legacy with opening a world of opportunities to her over the years.

"They have done a lot to give me my independence," she explains. "Early on, they helped me with budgeting and they also gave me financial support when I needed it. Oh, and it was through Legacy that I learned to drive and get my licence... but the biggest thing was that they helped me get into my own place."
