Matt Granger (Incoming President)

Welcome to my first President's message. I am honoured that the members of Legacy WA have given me the opportunity to take up the reins at a time when there has been considerable change within the organisation, a period where L/ Peter Emmett and the Board have been positioning us for the future. It is now an appropriate time to bed down those changes in structures and processes. With some tuning as necessary, we need to guide the organisation into the future so that it can continue to ensure that no dependant of an Australian Defence Force member suffers financial or social disadvantage as a result of the service-related death or incapacity of the member.

As the grandson of a former President of Fremantle Legacy I have been aware of Legacy and its mission since childhood. It saddens me to find that fewer and fewer Australians, military and civilian, are aware of what we do and who we support. When collecting on Badge Day I've often asked children, whose parents have encouraged them to put some coins in the tin, if they know what we do. Often the answer is "No", but a quick 'elevator pitch' and they begin to understand. Similarly, with some military personnel, their knowledge of what we do is limited, unless they have had enthusiastic

leaders who have encouraged awareness of the organisation.

This waning knowledge of Legacy is, in part, because we thankfully have fewer families affected by their service than we did during the socalled Great Wars and succeeding conflicts, and also because the ADF's efforts to improve OH&S during peace-time activities are light-years ahead of where they were when most of us joined.

What we will continue to experience though are escalating mental health challenges of all kinds.

This brings me to one of the targets against which I will measure my presidency: building relationships and promoting awareness of Legacy.

Early engagement with young sailors, soldiers and airmen at the time when they are still 6 foot tall and bullet-proof is vital. I believe that we should educate them about Legacy and its mission, and encourage them to ensure their families know we are here to support them if needed.

We are finding it increasingly difficult to make contact with eligible families and dependants (who often have never heard of Legacy) as privacy concerns and the law rightfully protects one's interests: our fear is that people are slipping through the cracks. In this matter I respectfully advocate to the leaders of the Australian Defence Force units in this State to assist Legacy WA to meet with their personnel to introduce and develop knowledge of Legacy and how we aid their families.

We currently support nearly

3700 beneficiaries in WA and are continuing our commitment to engage with them. Technology and privacy requirements have partly changed the way we interact with all of our beneficiaries, but our fundamental commitment remains consistent, timely and reliable personal support to those who need it.

Recently, I took part in the online AGM for our umbrella organisation Legacy Australia Inc. One of the clear messages from its financial report was that their donation revenue was down significantly for 2019/2020 as you would expect—and that this reduction was covered by an anonymous donation and bequests. Bequests cannot be relied upon to continually make up a shortfall. We are competing in a crowded market with many other well-intentioned not for profit organisations and donorfatigue during a recession makes the management of our funds a challenge. Our Finance Committee is actively developing models to ensure that we are making the most of our resources; and the Fundraising team with support from Torchbearers and Companions will continue to build relationships and manage activities using various resources.

The camp in Busselton is arguably the jewel in Legacy WA's crown. The strategy for the camp is now in the spotlight. The lease has a little over 10 years to run and the care and development of the camp is critical if we are to continue to provide this fantastic service and facility to our beneficiaries. We have a team of enthusiastic professional staff whose morale is noticeably high and they are ready to assist Legatees & Beneficiaries. They are trained and proficient in their roles and they strive daily to ensure the beneficiaries' needs are met.

A part of our intent to remain current in the community, I have asked the CEO to investigate and report to the Board how Legacy WA is interacting with the Indigenous Veteran community and to determine if we are providing culturally appropriate support and services to those families and Australian Defence Force members.

The Legacy of today has to operate differently to the Legacy of yesterday. Changes in corporate law, charity and not-for-profit laws, public expectations, privacy and the ceaseless variations in information technology have necessitated revisions to our operating model in order to continue to provide appropriate services to our beneficiaries. We have a committed team of Legatees, Reserve Members, Ambassadors and a considerable number of Companions who assist with the work of Legacy WA. I thank them all for their service and commitment to the organisation.

In closing I would like to thank L/Peter Emmett for his work in steering the Board for the last two years and to L/ Gavin Briggs for his contribution as Board Secretary. I welcome L/Ben Oakes and L/Sven Ross to the Board.

Meet Dazza!

Daryl Walton or Dazza as he is more affectionately known as, has become one of Legacy's most passionate and consistent fundraisers.

He is always one of the first to put his hand up to volunteer during Legacy's street appeals... he has even already booked off work for next year's ANZAC day and Legacy Week fundraisers so that he can volunteer!

Dazza served for the Royal Australian Navy and the Royal Australian Airforce for eight and a half years and is now heavily involved in supporting ex-service men and women and their families. In 1994, Dazza joined the Military Brotherhood, an organisation comprising of serving and ex-serving Australian Defence Force (ADF) and Commonwealth Forces members, their families, friends and support riders. Members of the Military Brotherhood enjoy riding their motorbikes together "to bond

together, to enjoy the road together and to look after each other." Dazza is now the Treasurer and QM of the Perth South sub branch and as their major beneficiary; the Military Brotherhood raises money for Legacy every year. This year, the Military Brotherhood raised an incredible \$8000 for Legacy WA! Since becoming a Legacy volunteer in 2015, Dazza has been involved in every street appeal and usually fundraisers at Midland train station as well as the CBD. His favourite memories of volunteering for Legacy include volunteering in the CBD and wearing the Navy bear suit which allowed him to see the excited response from the kids! Hearing Dazza talk about the work Legacy does, it was clear that the cause is very close to his heart.

As well as his work for Legacy, Dazza also volunteers for numerous other charities including the Cancer Council, the Salvation Army and the RSL. He has also participated in the Salvation Army Charity ride for the last 22 years! For his 50th birthday in 2015, Dazza participated in the Gibb River Postie Bike Ride for sick kids which raised a total of \$8000.

One of Dazza's proudest achievements was his impressive accomplishment this year. For Daffodil Day he organised a walk from his home in Forrestfield to the Perth CBD. Dazza arranged a specially made suit for the walk and raised \$11,650 for the Cancer Council. Dazza came in the top three highest fundraising totals across Australia... what an achievement!

With everything that he does for his community, it comes as no surprise that Dazza won the Stone Haven medal in 2019. The Stonehaven medal is awarded to a serving or exserving member of the RAN who 'goes above and beyond the normal call of duty' in their local community. Despite his incredible achievements, I was taken back by how modest Dazza was whilst discussing his award. He is well and truly a worthy winner of the award.

Dazza now works as a postie for Australia Post; however, it comes as no surprise that Dazza is no ordinary postie! Not only does Dazza go above and beyond in serving his community, he does the same with his regular job. During his time as a postie over the last 14 years, Dazza has become a local legend on his postie run as he regularly dresses up in costumes



and hands out lollies to kids. Dazza expressed how it *"gives him a buzz seeing people happy"* and how he likes to do everything he can to spread happiness in his community.

1. How did you become involved with Legacy WA?

After serving in the defence force for 12 years at various postings, Alan became a Legatee in 2002. He is passionate about the work that Legacy does and supporting the families of our veterans.

2. Do you have a favourite memory of being a part of the Legacy WA community?

Alan has many favourite memories of being a part of the Legacy WA community with putting on the Santa suit at Legacy Christmas carols and children's events and organising lunch for the Widows at Brookton being some of his favourites. Alan also said that "doing the street appeals/shopping centres is most rewarding when people stop and chat and show appreciation to ex-service members and also being able to assist them in finding more info re a family's descendants service history."

3. Why is it important for the community to support organisations such as Legacy WA?

"It is one of the few [organisations] where volunteers and Legacy put the

rubber on the road and it is always there to support those that need the support for our fallen and injured, spouses and children."

4. What did Legacy Week 2020 mean to you?

"That no matter what this year threw at us it was a privilege to see those that have had their own issues, still find the kindness to make a donation. We have heard about other charities struggling and yet Legacy has held its torch high."



Since joining Legacy, Georgia has attended three Legacy camps in Busselton and received education grants which allowed her to continue her high school education. Georgia's sister also attended camps through Legacy, including one in Canberra for ANZAC day.

Whilst discussing the impact of Legacy camps, Georgia said "Besides the physical and monetary aspects of Legacy, since joining Legacy I have gained a second family, made friendships that will last a lifetime and have been able to learn so much from many different people. The camps allowed me to spend time with people who understood how I was feeling, without even needing to talk about it."

After attending her first camp in 2018, Georgia was inspired by the supervisors which sparked her interest into pursuing a career in the Australian Army. After much research, she began her application for the Australian Defence Force Academy (ADFA). "Throughout my application process I had the support of friends from Legacy, as well as legatees from Legacy WA who helped me with my application and provided me with references," Georgia stated.

"During my last camp in 2020, I had so much support from the supervisors, especially the PTI who helped me gain mental and physical strength which has definitely helped me in my career to date. I know I will continue to use the lessons that I learnt on the camps in my career. I was also able to talk to the supervisors about their time in the Army, and gain an understanding of the ADFA and what life in the defence force would

'POOPS' Pets of **Older People**

Ann, a Busselton resident has been living with macular degeneration for the past 20 years. Having this condition which is the leading cause of blindness in Australia, as well as suffering heart failure last year changed how she lives day to day. Ann lives alone and was particularly concerned about her little dog Sophie as she could no longer take her for her walks.

Luckily for Ann she discovered the WA based not-for-profit Pets of Older Persons or POOPS as it is affectionately known as, that is helping to alleviate some of the worry felt by pet owners like Ann who are over the age of 65, palliative care patients of any age and people with disabilities. With a helping hand from volunteers at POOPS, Sophie is now getting out and about on a number of walks every week.

But it's not only Sophie who feels the benefits of these regular walks. Ann enjoys her visits from her volunteers who she says love to chat as much as she does and has said of her experience with POOPS:

"I think it's the best thing that's ever happened to me since I've been here, because before I was getting really down, not down in the dumps but you're just on your own a lot and now *I've got people coming nearly every* day... Sophie and I have a very busy *life meeting people and I love meeting* people I really do."

POOPS is run entirely by volunteers who assist with looking after all kind of pets including cats, rabbits and even once were delighted to assist with the care of a horse! They assist





by walking dogs as well as providing transport (to vets, boarding facilities or groomers), helping to administer medication or whatever is agreed by the volunteer and pet owner.

Mary Hasleby

Mrs Mary Hasleby was born near Buln Buln, a small town in Gippsland, Victoria and had three older brothers. She was a World War 2 nurse and a matron of Northampton Hospital. She was only 21 when she boarded the Queen Mary in Sydney as part of the voluntary aid detachment to work as a nurse in Palestine. This covered a period of two years working in various field hospitals, including the 7th Hospital which cared for the men who are now known as the Rats of

Tobruk. She was discharged in 1943 and returned to further nurse training in Melbourne. She graduated on the day peace was declared.

Mrs Hasleby moved to Perth at the end of 1947 and worked as a midwife at King Edward Memorial Hospital. In 1948 she arrived in Northampton as the relief matron and met Arnold Hasleby, who was also a RAAF World War 2 veteran. They married in 1949. The couple bought a farm at Nolba, east of Northampton, and later moved to a farm at East Bowes. The farm is still in the family and is now run by her son Chris and granddaughter Jessica. Mr Hasleby was tragically killed in road accident in 1975. Despite her loss, Mrs Hasleby continued to work for numerous charities, the local hospital, the Anglican Ladies Auxiliary, the CWA, Meals on Wheels the Red Cross, RS and more, until she was 90 year old. She was also a member of the Geraldton Laurel Club.

Jack Nie

Jack Nie had many jobs as a young fella – the Depression years were hard and you had to adapt – but none were as memorable as his time fighting for his country.

Jack was 21 when, in September of 1941, he and a mate applied for the RAAF – but they were offered postings with the ground crew. This was not form, according to Jack, who wanted to be a pilot.

So off to the Naval recruiting office they went, but there was a monthlong wait, which was too long without earning any money. So on impulse on their way home from Fremantle, Jack stopped at Claremont and was accepted into the Army almost at once. He was sent to Northam for training and just three weeks later, he was advised that he was off overseas.

Jack and the others were taken to Fremantle, where the HMS Queen Mary and Queen Elizabeth, both converted to troop carriers for the war years, awaited. The recruits sailed from Fremantle to the Middle East via Colombo, disembarking at Port Said, Egypt.

Much of Jack's training was carried

out in the then-Palestine on the Gaza Strip. After about a month, Jack was one of six soldiers sent to Tobruk, where they were became part of the 2/32 Battalion as reinforcements. The 2/32 was part of the 9th Australian Division. The division was withdrawn and spent time training at Gaza and Syria. From there, the division was mobilised to return to Egypt. Jack recalls that all troops were instructed to remove any evidence that would identify them as Australian. However, nobody thought to remove their boots, which were a giveaway because everyone wanted the Aussie boots.

From Alexandria, the Battalion was sent to Ruin Ridge, El Alamein. However, the troops realised they were too far forward at dawn, when, to their surprise, the learned the armour they'd heard overnight was in fact German, not British. A German officer instructed them all out of their foxholes or he would blow them out. This had the desired effect. It was July 17, 1942.

The 2/28th Battalion suffered the same fate, having also advanced too far. The Germans likened it to rounding up sheep. One of Jack's fondest memories was the repose he had with his mate Harry Davis, an Indigenous infantryman from Northam. During action, they would yell out to one another "G'Day Jack", to which Jack would reply "G'Day Harry".

The Germans handed their captives over to the Italians, who transported them to Benghazi and then to Taranto, in the south of Italy. The prisoners were distributed from the camp to work on farms as labour to harvest the rice crops. Red Cross parcels sometimes arrived and Jack remembers taking a pound of butter and dipping it in sugar, which he devoured in one sitting. The food given to the captives was mainly weak soup, which was not enough to stop them getting beriberi due a lack of vitamins.

When the Italians capitulated, the guards just walked away, so Jack and his mates wandered off with no one to watch them. At one of the farms they called in on, it was discovered that the elderly couple's son was a POW in Australia. As they made their way through the north of Italy, they were fed and housed by local farmers.

Jack and his mates eventually came across a high fence with bells attached. They tried to cut the wire with a knife but gave up due to its thickness, instead deciding to cautiously approach a bridge because there were no guards. It was there they ran into the arms of the Swiss Guards and just in time, too - because as they were being taken for questioning, the Germans swept down the other side of the fence looking for escapees

The Swiss did not have camps, all Allied troops were billeted in old schools or halls. Jack spent the rest of his time in Switzerland until Germany surrendered.

At the end of the European war, Jack and his mates were transferred to Marseilles, boarding a ship for Bombay, where they stayed for a week. This was in late 1944. From Bombay they set sail again and disembarked in Melbourne, before catching a train back to Perth, with returning soldiers dropped off along the way. During Jack's time away, he had exchanged letters with Yvonne Calder. After taking up a relationship upon his return, the pair married on May 16, 1945. The family still have the letters Jack wrote to Yvonne.

Jack was Discharged from the army and took up position with the then PMG as linesman stationed in Pinjarra, where he and Yvonne raised three children, Alexander, Carolynn (dec) and Barry.

In 1975 Jack and Yvonne moved to Mandurah to enjoy retirement, but Jack lost his beloved wife and now lives at the RAAFA nursing home in Meadow Springs, Mandurah.

He will celebrate his 100th birthday on June 14 surrounded by family and friends.
