CEO'S ADDRESS

Matt Granger

It's been a very busy time since the last edition of the Legacy Times. We had planned to publish this edition earlier however, workload did not allow this to happen. Hence, we have published a larger edition containing all the events, activities and news to date this year.

Sadly, the pre-ANZAC Day street appeal and AFL gamedays were not as lucrative as we'd hoped for. Plenty of lessons learned from these two events. The street appeal shared with the RSL for the first time created challenges, and the limitations placed on our team by Optus Stadium at the 11th hour also stymied the plan. We will be approaching these events with a revised plan next year and looking forward to improving the result.

The Cape-to-Cape trek was altogether more successful and Legacy WA's association with cricketer Mitch Johnson has developed into a solid foundation for the future. Mitch was certainly impressed by the beneficiaries we included in the trek, and their attendance drove home to him the importance of the work Legacy WA does.

The attendance by these beneficiaries was covered by the ANZAC Day Trust grant, and we will be assisting others with Leeuwin sailing and Outward Bound trekking via the grant. These funds must be expended within the financial year, else they will have to be returned. They do not come from our cash reserves and we are fortunate that my predecessor Vivian applied for and lobbied hard to achieve a multi-year grant.

The grants are also paying for a Christmas Jingle in July for the first time that we can recall. We have sufficient money to provide for Metro, Geraldton, Albany and Kalgoorlie Legatees; as well as our part-time employee Bernie - who now lives in Derby - hosting several Widows in Broome. We have also been able to include some of our older Persons with a Disability.

We have a new Minister for Veteran's Affairs, the local MP for Burt Matt Keogh. We will be writing to him soon to continue the dialogue begun with his predecessor, and through our state Minister for Veteran's Issues, Paul Papalia CSC, we will be

lobbying for a Federal grant for the upgrade of the Camp. Peter and I met with Paul last week and had a very productive outcome; details of which we will be able to share soon.

Busselton Council presented a draft Lease on lot 16 next door to our current site, over which we've had a legal review and acceptance by the Board. Once the Council resolves to let the site to us we'll be in a position to begin some work to make it habitable for Legacy use. At the very least, this includes moving the current footpath down to the beach to be sited in the middle of the two lots, and building up the dune behind the ablutions to stop water encroaching on the block during surge tides. We will be bound by development restrictions on the beach-side of the erosion line, but this still provides ample space to upgrade the camp.

We lost a staff member in June 2022, Tyler Eisenhauer in Events, who is returning to his roots as a personal trainer and we wish him the best for his future. We've also added a new member in Emily Briggs as our Social Media and Marketing Coordinator. Emily is in the final year of her tertiary qualification and works Mondays and Thursdays while fitting in her studies. Emily has volunteered for Legacy in the past doing street collection on badge day and we welcome her to the fold. Our part time employee/part time volunteer Helen will be off for four weeks, minimum, as she recovers from surgery and we wish her well also.

We are making significant headway with the database cleanse as all the listed beneficiaries have been contacted and we're onto the call-backs for those who didn't answer or respond. Volunteers L/Peter Lyneham and Linda, as well as Helen and Jess, have continued the great work that so many of you have assisted with. The project is driving the need for additional Legatees and staff to meet beneficiary requests and requirements.

Finally, Legacy WA welcomes Police Commissioner, Chris Dawson, who has been appointed Western Australia's 34th Governor. This follows 46 years of distinguished service to the community. He will be sworn in as the Queen's WA representative in July, 2022. Legacy WA would like to sincerely thank and acknowledge outgoing Governor, His Excellency the Honourable Kim Beazley AC and his wife, Susie Annus, for their dedication, and thank them for their involvement and outstanding contribution in the role over the past four years. I wish them every success for the future.

I'll have a lot more to write about next time regarding the Ball, The Legacy Centenary Torch Relay 2023 presented by Defence Health and outcomes from the Board Strategic Planning day on the 25th of June.

LEGACY CENTENARY TORCH RELAY

On 20th April 2022, the official launch of the 2023 Legacy Centenary Commemoration took place at the Shrine of Remembrance in Melbourne, the city in which Legacy was founded nearly 100 years ago by Stan Savage.

A significant part of the commemoration is the Legacy Centenary Torch Relay - a six-month campaign to pay homage to and acknowledge veterans' families, saluting their sacrifice.

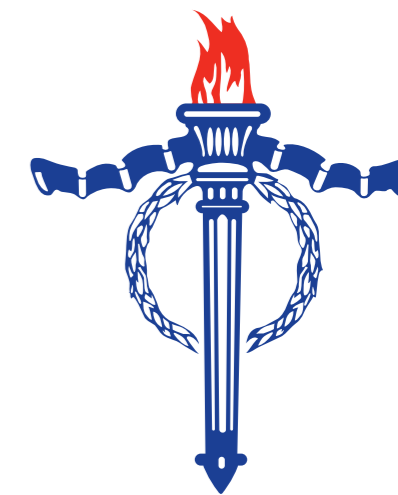
The relay begins on Anzac Day, 25th April 2023, in Pozieres, France and will travel to London, England, where it will continue its' tour throughout Australia - first stop, Western Australia.

The Legacy Centenary Torch Relay 2023, presented by Defence Health, is a satellite campaign, stopping at all Legacy Clubs world wide, including 44 in Australia and one in London, where support has been (and continues to be) provided. It will also be stopping at iconic Australian Landmarks.

Why the Legacy Torch?

The badge of Legacy is the Torch and Wreath of Laurel. The Torch signifies the undying flame of service and sacrifice of those who gave their lives for their country. The Wreath of Laurel is the symbol of our remembrance of them.

The Torch also represents the understanding that 'departed comrades' have passed the Torch onto their mates, the Legatees, to look after his treasured family the 'missus and kids' when he is no longer able. The flame also represents the heart and soul of Legacy.

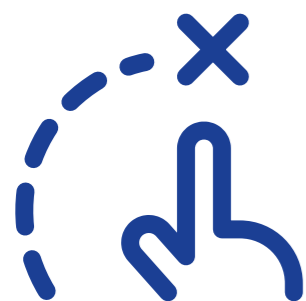

BENEFICIARY SPOTLIGHT

Everyone grieves differently after losing a partner and there is no right or wrong way of doing so.

However, Jessamy Welfare chose to keep embracing life – seizing each day – and more recently starting to help others do the same by using well-placed encouragement and acting as an inspiration to find a new path forward after suffering loss. She credits Legacy WA for helping her find the strength to do so.

After the death of her husband, Allan, in 2016, Jess found herself understandably sad and despondent.

Then out of the blue Legacy WA contacted Jess to see how she was coping.

"The gesture was so lovely," Jess said recently.

"I walked into Legacy House and the staff member at the front desk immediately offered me a cup of tea and a biscuit."

Jess said they walked out to the veranda and had a lovely chat.

"I was made to feel important, welcome and understood," Jess said.

"We had a number of chats over the next few weeks until it was suggested I join a Legacy social group.

"I was told it was a contemporary group of girls called the Lillies."

Jess said what was initially a polite distraction quickly turned into friendships that are now extremely special to her.

Legacy WA has a long history of using peer-to-peer support to connect with the families of veterans and understands someone who has walked in the same shoes can relate on the same level with authenticity and genuine understanding. Developing a rapport and trust is the first step to helping someone who may not even have grasped how much they are suffering.

“ I found my tribe, Jess said. They are my soul mates. ”

Jess said the group of Lillies were 'all in the same boat' and had an innate understanding of what she was going through straight away.

"We are such good friends," she said. "We go away to the Legacy Busselton Camp together and even have Christmas in July at the Yanchep Inn each year."

This mateship quickly gave Jess the confidence to start making plans –

and what plans they turned out to be.

Jess was always active but had given up much of her adventures after the death of her husband who always accompanied her.

However, after meeting the Lillies through Legacy WA she had developed the confidence and desire to start exploring by herself – ironically making countless lifelong friends along the way.

Later in 2016 Jess embarked on a self-guided hiking tour walking the Coast to Coast across England and then vagabonding around Scotland completely by herself.

"I couldn't even read a map properly," she said laughing at herself.

"I wanted to visit an English speaking country and while I was by myself, I was never alone," she said.

Jess recalled how she met up with a group of people who she is still in regular contact with today.

"There was Sean and Shirley and their rescue puppy, Penny," Jess said.

"Sean and Shirley are vegetarians so Penny would hang around me to get a little ham from my sandwich," Jess remembered fondly.

Her one month hiking tour around England and Scotland was such a success Jess soon made much more challenging plans to visit Papua New Guinea and hike Kokoda for the 75th anniversary of the Battle of Kokoda.

“ I trained twice a day by going up and down the cliffs at Craigie for almost a month. ”

Her ten days walking the Kokoda track was physically demanding but extremely rewarding.

"I spent the first few hours tip-toeing around mud and scrub before I slipped and landed on my bottom – a

filthy mess I decided to barrel through after that," she said.

"For some reason I am always the oldest in the group but it doesn't stop me making the most amazing friends."

Jess recalls the day the group went to commemorations at the monument at Isurava, erected in memory of those who fought in the Battle of Isurava on the Kokoda Track during World War II.

"We had to get up at 2:00am and walk along a slippery slope with a head torch to get there," she said.

"Going down a hill the scrub opened up and there it was.

"I had Allan's medals and two others in the group had their family members' medals too.

"Suddenly, Channel 9 from Australia turned up and because we had medals they took footage of us so

everyone back home in Perth could share in the special moment with me. It was so unexpected," Jess smiled.

"We had decided to move on when I noticed a helicopter overhead.

"It turned out to be Sir Peter Cosgrove and his wife."

"I missed them by minutes – something I regret to this day," said Jess.

Once back in Perth Jess once again started planning for yet another trip – this time to Japan after her son, who speaks Japanese, made the suggestion.

So, in 2018 Jess was off again, backpack in tow, headed for the Nakasendo Way – a self guided walking tour along the historical trail from Kyoto to Tokyo.

"This time accommodation was booked for me along the way," Jess said.

"I found the Japanese people to be extremely friendly. If I asked for directions they would not just point, but walk with me five blocks to where I needed to go."

The COVID-19 pandemic temporarily put a stop to Jess' trekking exploits until recently when she jumped at the chance to participate in the Cape-to-Cape fundraising trek that raised over \$50,000 for Legacy WA.

"My friends from my England hiking tour were some of the people who sponsored me," she said.

Jess now wants to give back to Legacy WA, raising \$6,467 during the Cape-to-Cape and providing support and friendship to other widows.

Jess is trying to inspire people to try new things and go outside their comfort zone, showing how to move past loss in order to reach their potential.

Even last weekend Jess was

motivating someone to experience nature and enjoy life.

"There are a group of us from the RSL that go kayaking at Hillarys (boat harbour) however, last weekend it was raining," Jess said.

"I was the only one who turned up but my RSL kayaking leader, Doug, insisted we go paddling even though he doesn't like getting wet!

"We had a brief shower but the minor setback was worth it when a dolphin started diving up out of the water in front of my kayak and before we knew it, an entire pod was swimming around us," Jess said the encounter was topped off by a double rainbow.

"It was a very special moment for both of us," Jess said. Being such an avid photographer Jess regretted not having her camera.

"I can't have it all the time especially when it might get damaged or wet", she said.

However, Jess finds other opportunities to take photos, walking around Perth city taking photos of architecture, capturing the essence of the Busselton Camp or snapping some action while stretching with the Silver Salties - a program for older Australians (65+ years) at Surf Life Saving Clubs throughout Australia, promoting physical activity, social connections and involvement in the surf lifesaving community.

Jess reflected that she is struggling to decide what to do next.

"Maybe cycle through Crete and Sicily," Jess said whimsically.

Whatever, Jess embarks on next I am sure she will continue to attract friends and make genuine connections.

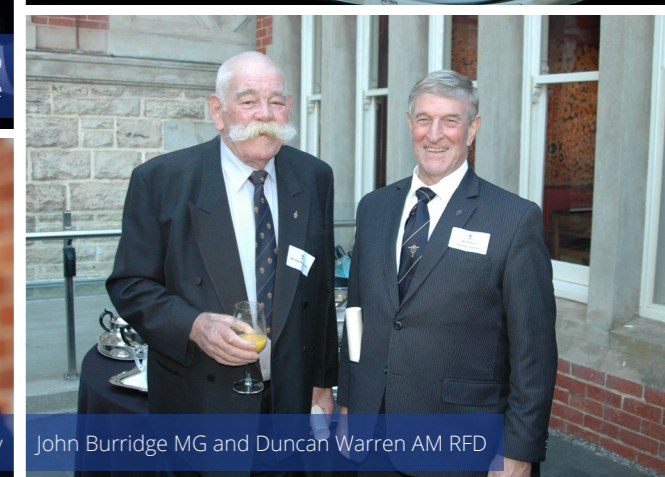

Duncan represented Legacy on numerous committees outside Legacy.

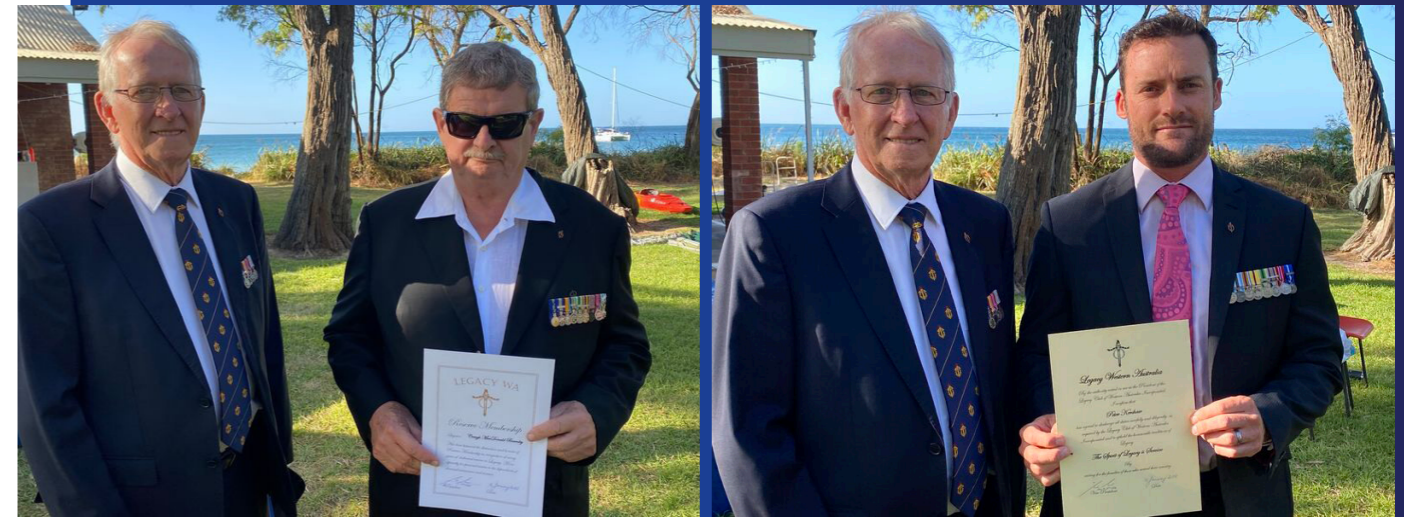
Legatee Kim Farmer

Beneficiary Data Cleanse

In November 2021, our new CEO, Matt Granger, made a commitment that staff must contact all our 3,250 registered Legacy WA beneficiaries in order to touch base, see if there is anything within our scope we could assist with and significantly, update contact details. This is called a Data Cleanse.

However, after almost six months we have only managed to speak with just over half.

Regrettably, this means Legacy WA has lost contact with a large number

of our beneficiaries over the years. The reason for this varies and includes beneficiaries not updating contact information, Legatees not maintaining contact with their beneficiaries, miscommunication, Legatee attrition and incorrect data entry techniques. As a result, we are discovering some Legacy ladies that are sadly vulnerable and in urgent need of assistance. We urgently want to speak to these individuals or their families.

The next phase of the Data Cleanse is concentrating on finding lost beneficiaries and entering the data of

those we have managed to contact but whose details have changed.

If you are a beneficiary and have not been in contact with Legacy WA recently (since November 2021) please contact us to let us know you are ok and make sure your contact details are correct – even if you don't want to be registered anymore. Where a beneficiary is unable to make contact we strongly urge a family member to do so. This five minute act will save time-poor staff countless hours trying to locate registered widows.

The Pensions department are working away investigating and lodging claims. We have had a recent influx of inquiries and are doing our best with a mix of working from home and at Legacy House.

It's important to remember that decisions are made in accordance with the relevant Act by the Department of Veterans' Affairs determining staff. The Acts and the statements of principles that are used to determine the relationship of causes of death with

service are reviewed from time to time as and when new medical information becomes available. For that reason, a past rejection of a claim does not mean that it will be rejected for all time.

Cape to Cape Trek Raises \$56 570

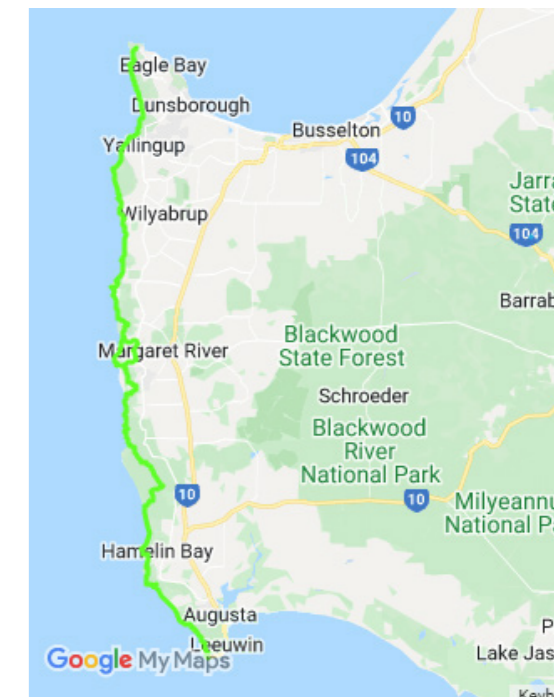

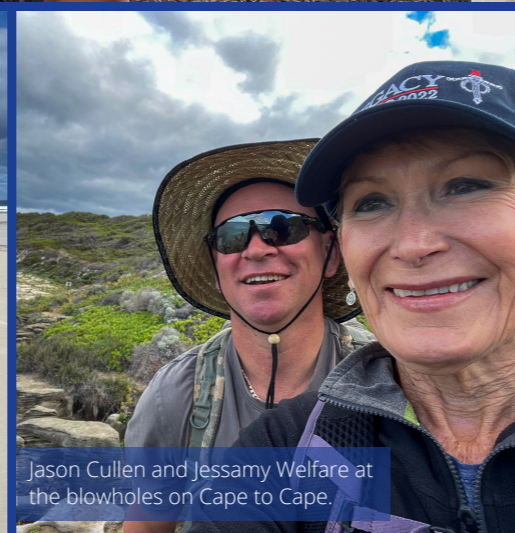

Legacy’s Story Told Through Art

As part of the Australian Day 2022 event, Aboriginal artists, Deborah Newenham, and her daughter, Kristy Spillman, painted the Legacy story using the traditional dot technique to create an impressive art work.

Legacy’s initial inception, challenges and how it has evolved over 100 years was depicted in the painting. Individual elements were then translated into words so people from all walks of life can share in the understanding of what the painting represents.

The elements can be clearly seen in the painting and include:

- Legacy logo
- In the trenches of the Western Front during WWII, a soldier said to his dying mate, “I’ll look after the

missus and kids.” This became known as The Promise, and it is still kept today.

- Kangaroo signifying ambition, protections, strength and ease of movement.
- Emus are the indigenous interpretation of moving forward.
- Dolphin signifies harmony and peace.
- The many services in Legacy that work together to help.
- Feet represent Legatees who volunteer the support that Legacy provides its beneficiaries.
- Sunflowers reflect focus, healing and warmth.

- Bridge representing your bridge with Legacy.
- Legacy grew out of the ashes of WWII.
- Turtles represent protection, retreat, healing, tranquility, longevity and perseverance.

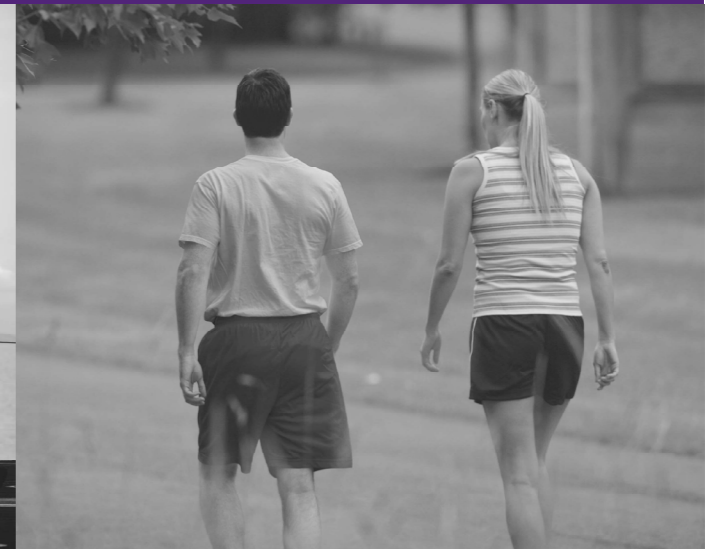

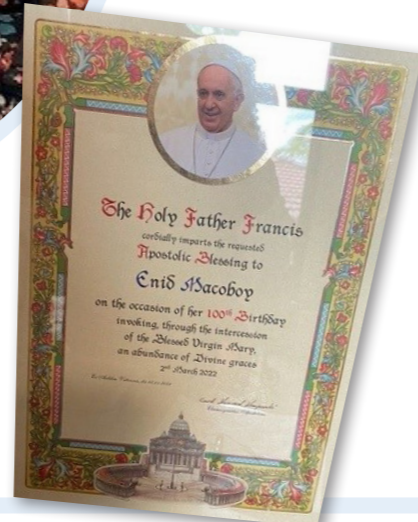

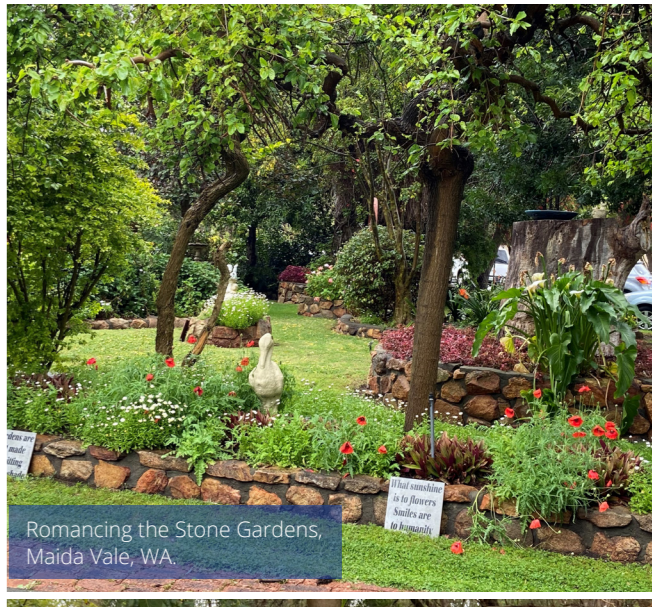
