

Monday 23rd of January will officially start the countdown for Legacy WA being 100 days until the torch reaches Western Australian soil, touching down first in Albany. Hello and welcome to 2023! I hope that the holiday season has treated everyone well.

I can confirm that the Albany Legatee Group was successful in establishing the new Laurel Club in Albany. Jean Webb has taken on the challenge after the Australian War Widows closed their operation in Albany. We look forward to working with Jean and the ladies down south.

As noted in my last address, beneficiaries have an opportunity to enjoy additional social activities this year as we still have funds to expend from the Anzac Day Trust. I encourage all beneficiaries to consider what they might like to participate in and reach out to

Legacy WA with suggestions. Activities may include theatre, movies, or a special lunch This opportunity is not limited to the Perth metro ladies but is for country beneficiaries too. Contact the Community Services Team with any suggestions: tracey.hamel@legacywa.com.au or 9486 4900.

In early December, I was fortunate to attend the Korean War Memorial Groundbreaking in Kings Park hosted by the Perth Korean War Memorial Committee. The memorial is due for completion in July 2023 and I intend to bring all Korean-era beneficiaries to Perth, including country folks, and accommodate them for the service. More information is to be sent out in the coming months.

The 'Better Together Ball' was successfully conducted on the 12th of November. Very encouraging feedback from those who attended, and all asking if we'll be doing it again in 2023. That is the plan and we'll be kicking off the working committee in the New Year. I went to lunch with the Lillies in late November and was very pleased to have one of them tell me that she'd had a great time as she hadn't put on a ball dress in over 25 years. We are grateful for Defence West support (a state-government body) as they kindly donated the table for our 10 widows who were drawn from a basket of applicants for a seat.

Starting in 2023, resident Western Australian Legacy beneficiaries and their dependants or carers who are registered with, and recognised by, Legacy WA can stay at the camp free of charge while we are in receipt of funds from the ANZAC Day Trust. This negates the problems and differences of opinion regarding 5-, 7- or 10-day entitlement to the camp. Possible scenarios include:

- Any Beneficiary with children in our database can stay for free. Any other family members who join them are required to pay.
- Widow and carer: both stay for free
- Able-bodied widow or beneficiary taking some friends to the camp: the widow/beneficiary stays for free and the friends have to pay.

The procedure for booking will be:

Make your booking through the online system (payment via card for all attendees) as current practice. Payment at the time of booking must take place as we've no way to manage 100% discounts at this phase. Once your stay is completed: submit a claim to Legacy House. We will have a Claim Form created soon that will show the names and numbers of the beneficiaries/children/carers as well as the account into which Legacy will pay the reimbursement.



By the time this has been published, our 2023 Kid's Camp would have wrapped up. We expect 103 kids to attend, which will see 47 kids fly over from east, New Zealand and even the United Kingdom.

In order to maximise the provision of support to those families in most need, Legacy WA has begun the process of developing a system of 'tiered support', based on the system used by most other capital city clubs. The policy will be scaled at three tiers of support based on individual family needs. We will be rolling it out via training to those Legatees who have family liaison responsibilities, and your Legatee will be responsible for meeting with the family and discussing the finer details of the policy.

Legacy Australia is celebrating 100 years! To commemorate this moment, one of the significant parts of the centenary is the Legacy Centenary Torch Relay presented by Defence Health. It will be a six-month campaign to pay homage to and acknowledge veterans' families, saluting their sacrifice.

The relay begins on Anzac Day, 25th April 2023, in Pozieres, France and will travel to London, England, where it will continue its tour throughout Australia - the first stop, Albany, Western Australia.

The torch will touch down in Albany on the 3rd of May 2023 and we will be celebrating its arrival in Perth with a community day on the 6th of May. More information on this will be shared in the coming weeks.





Meet our new Vice President! Brett Dowsing

On Saturday 5 November 2022, I was honoured to be voted in as the Vice President of Legacy WA to relieve Ian McNee following his five excellent years in that and other senior Legacy positions. Having only been a Legatee for a little over a year, I am now committed to try to meet these leadership obligations along with maintaining my contributions to the basic duties of Legatees - looking after veterans' widows/widowers and their children. When I joined Legacy it was to commit to only doing the latter, nevertheless, I hope my capabilities will now assist in taking our organisation forward both in our care services to veterans' families and in our staff's supporting abilities.

By way of background, I grew up in country WA and in colonial Papua New Guinea before joining the Navy as a 15 year old in 1969. Following training as an officer, my early career was largely spent commanding sea-air rescue boats and patrol boats, and piloting helicopters. My mid-career years were spent in

policy directorates of Navy Headquarters and my remaining period largely in international diplomacy (Timor-Leste, USA, Republic of Korea and Mongolia) and higher command positions. Over my career, I've been fortunate to have held five commands (three boats, a helicopter squadron and Fleet Base West), and achieved my final rank of Commodore as Senior Officer in Western Australia before retiring at the commencement of 2020.

Since retiring, I have been fortunate to also be a board member of the Veterans Review Board, Royal Australian Air Force Association – WA and Bravery Trust; position holder in the Naval Officers Club and the Naval Historical Society; on the committee for the Korean War Memorial Project and the Australian Naval Cadets Foundation; and am also a practising Justice of the Peace. A week after being elected Vice President of Legacy WA, I was honoured in being inducted as the Warden to the State War Memorial and will hold this position through to Remembrance Day 2023.


Sonia and I recently celebrated 40 years of marriage and are proud parents of two adult daughters and grandparents to two grandsons. I have a Masters in Science and Technology, a Graduate Diploma in Strategic Studies and enjoy reading, good food and wines, and travel.

rather than on ourselves as I believe this is the common aspiration of all veteran and family support services. In this, I seek to be an example and have fun doing so.








A message from His Excellency the Honourable Chris Dawson APM Governor of Western Australia

As many readers would know, Marlene has been responsible for planning and executing Legacy's annual Christmas Jingle, which brings together our Beneficiaries for an end of year celebrations. Legatee Spotlight Peter Heeney

In this edition of the Legacy Times, we would like to draw your attention to a well-respected individual who is essential to Legacy. As Peter Heeney has recently concluded an eight-year role as the National Director representing Western Australia, we would like to highlight some of Peter's personal and career highlights over the years.

Peter Heeney was born on 06-Dec-1948 in Carlton Victoria. Peter spent his early years attending Collingwood Technical School. In October of 1968, he was enlisted in the Australian Army where he was a qualified Operator Work Study Member for the Mechanical Engineers Institute. During 1970 and 1971, Peter saw active service in South Vietnam with the 2nd Battalion the Royal Australian Regiment. Peter retired in 1996 with the Rank of Major.

Peter's Legacy journey started in 1981 when his Regimental Sergeant Major took him to Legacy in Townsville where he was inducted as a Legatee. Since then, Peter has been involved with Legacy clubs in Melbourne, Albury, Yarra Valley and Perth where he has held multiple positions including Presidency. Peter was on every committee, including committees that no longer exist, including Country Legacy. Whilst being the President in 2008, Peter was commissioned to the "Widow and Children Statue" that is currently in Fremantle, Monument Hill. Peter was the first President of Legacy WA when Perth and Fremantle amalgamated and was involved in inducting the first female Legatee into Legacy in Western Australia in 1994.



When he isn't working with Legacy, Peter is kept busy with the Korean War Memorial Committee where he is the secretary/ treasurer. The memorial will be unveiled on the 27-July-2023 so make sure you keep an eye out!

A very proud moment for Peter Heeney was singing at Domain Stadium in Perth on the 24-Apr-2016 during the Dockers and Carlton ANZAC Day game. Check out Peter's performance through the QR Code.



Data Cleanse

Thank you to all the beneficiaries taking our calls over the last year which enabled us to ensure we have all your correct details and made available legacy WA's services.

The Community Service team has come to the end of the 655 direct referrals from the data cleanse. These direct referrals allowed the team to ensure our beneficiaries had access to our services and offer support and guidance on a variety of issues. Other issues included DVA referrals and general information, information about My Aged Care and other resources

surrounding living independently, referrals for ACAT assessments, referrals for monitored personal alarms, internal referrals for Pension enquiries.

The team organised 105 referrals to our future documents Solicitor for wills and **Enduring Power of Attor**ney's and Enduring Power of Guardianships.

We referred 427 beneficiaries to Legatees who will look after the welfare of their allocated widows. The remaining beneficiaries who were contacted had plenty of support which included

family and friends or were in Aged Care facilities and had minimal needs, thus did not require a legatee.

The Community Service Team set up a call-back system for a beneficiary who did not require a welfare Legatee to visit on a regular basis but would like a welfare check on a regular basis. 130 beneficiaries requested this service and Legatee's have started actioning the welfare checks.

Legacy Busselton Camp

Electric BBQ Cooktops

Visitors at the camp have been using portable gas BBQs that are well past their used by date. They are dirty and some of the burners and faulty. Furthermore, they leave the gas bottles turned on after use as gas can leak and pool in corners and confined areas.

Rather than replacing them with domestic BBQs with a short used by date, we have opted for commercial BBQs complete with built-in safety features - including an automatic shut off if left inactive.

Unlike older commercial BBOs, these will reach 'sizzling' temperatures quickly

and are designed with food hygiene, cleaning and cooking performance in mind. The BBQs are able to quickly heat a full plate of food in a single cooking cycle. present a safety risk if people Low-powered BBQs can take twice as long while consuming the same power meaning energy efficiency is a tick too.

> This will bring the number of commercial BBQs to three and will meet peak demand requirements at camp. The two new additions will be installed adjacent to an existing commercial BBQ.

While the initial cost outlay will be more than domestic BBQs, they will be cost effective over their lifetime (10 years plus) and Legacy WA will not incur any financial impost as they will be covered by grants awarded specifically for the camp.



Arborist

Poorly maintained trees are a liability and safety concern. Pruning and removing the large trees located in bushland at the camp can be dangerous if not done by a professional who will also ensure council regulations are not breached.

Therefore we hired an arborist to address the manage-

ment and care of the trees and vegetation at camp. The scope of work included pruning the high-traffic quadrangle, playground and entrance.

All foliage was mulched and timber was left on site as firewood rings.

Thankfully, the costs of these

professional services were covered by grants awarded specifically for the care and maintenance of the camp.

Cyber Security

The threat has proven to be very real as demonstrated by recent breaches suffered by Optus and Medibank Private.

As such Legacy WA have taken steps to roll out measures to strengthen data protection with the help of our IT provider and networks who also advise the Australia Defence Force.

We remind all beneficiaries to be cautious. Your best protection is your wisdom and sense of what feels right and wrong built up over your lifetime. Please trust your instincts. When in doubt don't take the risk and delete or hang up.



Human Resources | Training and Development



Changes to Work Health and Safety legislation came into effect in March 2022 harmonising most of the Australian states and territories. The training was rolled out via our Learning Management System. This included the working-from-home policy and assessment for staff.

Volunteers will also need to conduct training in the future to meet our compliance obligations.

Our main database is called CRM. Training is being conducted for those who need standardisation or initial training.

Safety and Risk Management

The Australian Institute of Company Directors (AICD) Not-for-Profit Governance Principles document outlines various principles of good governance, which the Board uses to inform their approach. Principle 5 - Risk Management – requires 'Board decision making to be informed by an understanding of risk and how it is managed.

Operations continues to work with the risk assessment group to identify and map risks plus more recently, incidents, in order to inform the Board, and other stakeholders plus improve health and safety.



Grant Submission



Grant funding continues to be an important focus for Legacy WA.

An Anzac Day Trust second year allocation is expected soon. The Stan Perron Grant was also successful, and the Telethon Grant 2023 is being considered by their trustees.

The 2023 Australia Day Community Grants submission is being considered.

RPS Group Donates IT and Office Equipment

Legacy WA is the grateful recipient of a wide variety of second hand equipment generously donated by the RPS Group after the company moved offices recently.

The list of donated items is a treasure trove of goodies including over 50 computer monitors and stands, keyboards, smart TV, a paper folding machine, binder and supplies, conference camera and speakers, stationery (stablers, paper products, pens, calculators, lever arch folders, trays), footstools and kilometres of cables and adapters. We even found a painted terracotta pot that will brighten

up Legacy House and encourage someone to bring in an office plant.

The haul was made possible by RPS employee, Sandi Newman-Laws, who coordinated every one of a number of steps required before we could make arrangements for collection and transport in early November 2022.

RPS supports Legacy Nationally via a number of other initiatives throughout the year.

RPS was founded in 1970 and shares a dream of creating an environmental planning practice dedicated to making the world a better place, raising awareness on the importance of balance to protect the environment itself and the welfare of the people living in it.

Beneficiary Data Base Cleanse


It was a marathon but the cleanse is finally finished!! This was the third time the data cleanse had been attempted in recent memory, the most recent attempt commenced in November 2021. Legacy WA is still trying to locate around 300 beneficiaries who have not responded to calls or letters asking them to update their details.

We have also conducted thorough investigations and at times, found Legatees willing to door knock on the last known address of lost widows. However, if there are no leads, we are planning to inactive these widows. They

can always be reactivated later if contact is made with Legacy WA.

With an accurate database, the Board and management can make informed decisions about plans moving forward and the allocation of resources.

As a result of the data cleanse, we have discovered a large number of Legacy ladies who require assistance from our in-house community services team. The additional pressure on resources has meant the team has grown to one full-time and three-part employee.



We are looking at a beautiful tribute to the men and women who served this Country.


This day we will share our first visit to ANZAC HOUSE since it reopened. Our invitation to a tour and lunch has been looked forward to by our Club.
















Fremantle
